

We are now in the heart of the Easter Season. John's Gospel presents us with a world, where the Risen Christ continues to have an impact on the lives of his followers.

A series of speeches from Jesus, with powerful sentiments, are designed to ground the disciples and the early Church in one of the most fundamental aspects of his teaching. God's love for all of humanity. When John talks about the love of God, he is clear what he means: 'This is the love I mean: not our love for God, but God's love for us.' The same message appears in the Gospel: 'You did not choose me, no, I chose you.' God has made an everlasting decision to love us. God's love is first, God has opted for us, declared his choice, taken us on. It is a decisive movement of love that began with the Father. 'As the father has loved me, so I have loved you. Remain in my love.' So here lies the task before us believers. Allowing God's love to come into our lives, to feel it, to recognise it, to believe it. These are the first steps. But now comes the challenge. We are to remain in God's love. This will mean that we too must make a choice. We choose to believe that for some reason, God has seen fit to embrace humanity, with all its shortcomings. We remain in his love. Jesus shows that he could have no greater love than to lay down his life for the sake of others. That is the powerful message of Easter.

REFLECT

story is told of a brilliant surgeon. It was his first time that a particular brain operation had been carried out in the country. It was performed upon a young man of great promise. It was an operation of the greatest delicacy in which a small error would have had fatal consequences. In the outcome, the operation was a triumph. But it involved several hours of intense and uninterrupted concentration on the part of the surgeon. When it was over, a nurse had to take him by the hand, and lead him from the operating theatre like a blind man or a little child.

That kind of self-giving and concentration on the needs of another reflects something of the quality of God's love in Jesus. This kind of love is sometimes beyond our comprehension. Jesus hopes that we will choose to keep on giving of ourselves in love, even when the giving hurts, even when we feel that we have nothing else to give. But it's that kind of love that mirrors God's kind of love. He loves us beyond all telling.

Some might say that this is the message we find the hardest to believe. That despite all my shortcomings and failings, there is a love that comes from God, that is unrelenting in its power. We receive this gift freely. As Jesus says, 'You did not choose me, no, I chose you.'

Dear sisters and brothers,

I hope that you are continuing to enjoy the Season of Easter, the most beautiful of all the seasons, and as the days lengthen and we see a bit more of the sun than we have throughout the first quarter of the Year of Our Lord 2024, we have a spring in our step as the disciples of Christ.

One of the ways in which the Enabling Our Mission Campaign will benefit our parish is in the establishment of deanery service hubs. Currently, most parishes have an office, although many do not have administrators, as we do; in the future, parishes will be working much more closely together, sharing common resources so that as parish families we can better fulfil our mission. So, financial management and property management will be shared in the deanery service hub, with each parish still maintaining its ownership of its property and its own bank accounts. Our parish is in the vanguard of this, as it is in many diocesan initiatives, and I am currently in discussion with the diocesan offices in Nottingham and the other parishes in northern Lincolnshire to set up a deanery service hub to serve our parishes.

This means that the role of parish administrator is changing, and we will begin that process now. Duncan is a great support to me, as Amanda was, and I know that you appreciate very much the work of the parish office, which has developed since I was appointed as your parish priest in January 2017. However, the development of the parish administrator's role into a deanery administrator role means that Duncan will not just be based in this parish going forward; once the deanery service hubs have been established, he will be working for the other parishes which will be served by it as well.

This means that I am looking for volunteers who can come to be with me in the Presbytery and support me when people come to see me by providing a warm welcome and a drink, answering calls, printing the *Sunday Message*, which is an important but time-consuming job, and other materials, helping to ensure that the Sunday crates are prepped and delivered to the three churches. I am hoping that, as with the rota of stewards' enough people may be willing to volunteer to spread the workload and receive the satisfaction which comes from having a part to play and playing your part.

This does mean that there may not always be an answer straightaway if you call or email the Parish Office. If you call 01472 342301 and there is no answer, <u>please leave a voicemail</u> and Duncan will get back to you as soon as he can. If you telephone the Parish Office, and there is no answer and you need to speak to me in a case of necessity, please call 07943059747 – please leave a voicemail if I do not answer, and I will be in touch as soon as I can.

A Letter for Safeguarding Sunday from Bishop Patrick

"This is my commandment, love one another as I have loved you."

(John 15:12)

Today is Safeguarding Sunday. It's an opportunity to reflect a little on our ongoing journey as a diocese to build a safer environment for every person. You will recall that the Elliott review in 2020 recommended that the Catholic Church in England and Wales put in place a national safeguarding body. In July 2021 the Catholic Safeguarding Standards Agency was formed. Its task is to ensure that all dioceses are regulated to meet the national standards recommended in the Elliott Report.

As a diocese, our priority is to ensure that we are providing a safe environment for all those who come in contact with our parishes, chaplaincies, and the Catholic organisations at work throughout the diocese. So I do want to assure you that the diocese is very much committed to embedding robust safeguarding standards. The professional support of our Diocesan Safeguarding Department now enables the safer recruitment and training of all clergy, employees and volunteers. It also ensures that we are transparent and accountable in the way that all allegations and concerns are managed.

I wish to thank the Diocesan Safeguarding Department of Rachael Campion, Alan Booth and Jane Black for all their good work. I would also like to express my gratitude to the priests and parish safeguarding representatives for their generous commitment to improving safeguarding practices in their parishes. Additional training for clergy and parish safeguarding representatives is now in place. There is also safeguarding information available on the diocesan website, and an easy to read and comprehensive guide to safeguarding has been produced in the form of a very helpful Parish Safeguarding Handbook. Please do take a look at this material because it is the responsibility of each of us to help ensure that our churches and chaplaincies are both safe and welcoming. This is something that cannot just be left to the Diocesan Safeguarding Department, the clergy and the parish safeguarding representatives.

From meeting with and listening to victims and survivors of child sexual abuse I have come to understand, ever more deeply, that sexual abuse not only heinously violates a child at the time of their abuse, but it all too often cruelly robs a child of their future. Victims and survivors of sexual abuse continue to carry throughout their lives the painful and debilitating consequences of the grave crime of sexual abuse. I do not underestimate the traumatic and life-long consequences of sexual abuse upon their lives and how it also affects their families and parish communities. Please know that my door, and that of our Diocesan Safeguarding Department, is always open to anyone affected by abuse.

Like you, I continue to love Christ's Church, but I acknowledge that sexual abuse has stained the face of the Church and it has undermined her mission. I feel a deep sense of shame for this abuse. So, as Bishop, I am committed to ensuring that we do everything that we each can to learn from the past and to protect and keep safe the most vulnerable in our communities. There can be no room in our diocese for complacency or for not taking seriously the need for vigilance on the part of all of us. Thank you for doing all you can to support your parish priest and parish safeguarding representative* in fostering a deeper and more evident culture of safeguarding, care and protection for everyone in your parish or chaplaincy.

Crowning of Our Lady – 19th May 2024: May is Our Lady's month, and on the Solemnity of Pentecost, when we remember that the Holy Spirit descended upon the disciples who were gathered in the Upper Room with Our Lady, we will crown the statues of Our Lady in Corpus Christi Church and Sat Mary on the Sea Church during Mass, and at 3.00 pm we will have Eucharistic Adoration with the recitation of the Five Glorious Mysteries on Our Lady Star of the Sea Church, followed by the Crowning of Our Lady in the Grotto.

During this month of May, please remember to say the rosary and find in Our Lady an example of Christian discipleship that we all can follow.

Enabling Our Mission Campaign: As parishioners, we are all called to play an active role in the life of our parish, our Diocese and the Universal Church, proclaiming, celebrating and living our Christian faith in everything that we say and do. Thank you so much for your generosity! Last weekend was a great success for the Enabling Our Mission Campaign here in our parish. I am delighted to tell you that we have now surpassed our target of £160,000 and based on the cards filled out by parishioners at Mass we stand to receive an additional £30,000 on top of this!

To allow us to draw a line under the campaign, we need to make sure that all pledges have been recorded properly. If you completed a small card at Mass recently, you will receive a pledge form for completion in the post or via email in the coming days. I ask that you return the form at your earliest convenience to either the parish office, to me or the stewards after Mass or directly through the post. While you may not wish to start your pledge immediately, can I ask that you return your form, indicating a start date and method of payment that is convenient to you. Our hope is that parishioners will consider what they can as every pledge counts, and all pledges and one-off donations will bring us closer to our shared goal. Please sign the Gift Aid Declaration if you are eligible to do so.

I know there are some families out there who are still considering their pledge and I would be delighted to receive your support. While we are guaranteed to receive 40% of our initial target of £160,000, our parish will receive 50% of everything raised over this and so we have much to benefit

from. We hope to receive the majority of pledges within the next two weeks, so that we can see exactly how much has been raised. Any 'one off- gifts will be included in these totals, which will benefit the Diocese and our parish.

If you would prefer to give a 'one off' gift, please speak to me after Mass or contact me by phone or email; similarly, anyone who needs any assistance with completing the forms or cards is welcome to speak to me after Mass or contact me. 


